11) The Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System (KTRS) is facing a large unfunded liability, which means it owes more money in benefits to retirees and current teachers than it can make in investments over the next 30 years. But the system is not in danger of failing, it can continue paying benefits for the next 21 years. One possible solution to funding the KTRS would require state government to take out \$3 Billion in loans (bonds) and then give the money to the KTRS to invest. Supporters of that plan say historically low interest rates would allow the KTRS to make money off investments while state government pays off the bonds. Opponents say state government can't afford to go any deeper into debt and it's possible the KTRS could actually lose money investing the money from the bonds.

Should the General Assembly authorize the \$3 Billion in loans (bonds) to provide more money for the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System to invest while the taxpayers pay the money back over 10 years?
