Homeplace primed for third win with fall festival

Homeplace on Green River is going for its third 2018 win September 8 with its Fall Heritage Family Festival. Coming off a record attendance plow day/spring festival and a very successful inaugural year of theater productions in the newly renovated barn, the historic farm expects to complete the trifecta with a record fall festival attendance

The strong new additions this year and returning favorites from past years are cause for high expectations for this 11th year of the festival.

Headlining the new activities September 8 will be Kay Gschwind and Ben Burgess with their Suffolk Punch draft horses demonstrating how logging was accomplished prior to tractors and log skidders. They will also bring a restorative forestry educational exhibit and demonstration of modern horse-logging methods, sponsored by the Southern Suffolk Punch Gathering Group.

There will be at least 50 artists and crafters, exhibitors and food vendors. Four music groups will be rocking the barn all day long.

The festival will see many of the most popular activities from previous years returning. Included will be Somerset's Liberty Nature Center with their raptors including hawks, falcons and Allegiant, the bald eagle. The alpacas from Barnett's Creek Farm will also be there. The festival is a family event, and special activities for the young and those who wish they were young will include hay rides, a barrel train, and a barn-sized hay maze. Food vendors will be selling pull pork, tenderloin, catfish, hot dogs, snow cones, lemonade, Mayfield ice cream and plenty of other festive foods

The list goes on and is still building. The only charge will be a \$10 per vehicle parking fee and anything spent for food and purchases from the artists and crafters. All other activities are free. Partial schedule set for fall show barn

Three stage performances are already scheduled for the fall season in the barn at Homeplace. They will be following a successful inaugural summer of stage performances in the recently renovated barn

The very popular *Smoke on the Mountain* will be returning to Homeplace September 29. Many who missed the June performance have asked for a return show so the Homeplace board and Lindsey Wilson Theater department decided to bring back Pastor Oglethorpe and all of the Sanders family. According to the reviews, Smoke on the Mountain is one of the most produced plays world-wide. Try it, you'll like it.

November 3, Lindsey Wilson Director of Theater and Kentucky Chautauqua performer Robert Brock will bring Abraham Lincoln's law partner for 18 years and Green County native Billy Herndon to the Homeplace stage.

Billy Herndon felt he knew Abraham Lincoln better



than Lincoln knew himself. When Lincoln was leaving for his inauguration as our 16^{th} President he told Herndon to keep his name on the shingle outside their office because he intended to return someday. But, of course, he did not.

Brock's portrayal of Herndon is

fascinating, entertaining and informative history as recorded by Lincoln's long-time friend, Billy Herndon. Brock's presentation is made possible in part by The Kentucky Humanities Council and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Finally, December 5 Lindsey Wilsons choral director, Gerald Chafin with bring his singers to Homeplace to perform Handel's Messiah. They will be accompanied by members of the Louisville Orchestra. This performance has been an annual concert for several years, but this will be the first time it's been performed by the college's choir in an informal venue.
